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Notes:

- 1. Gradings** – All coaches qualifying after 1st January 2013 will only be qualified to grade subject to the Coach successfully completing the Technical Grading Module at the appropriate level.
- 2. Matside Coaching** – All coaches qualifying after 1st January 2013 will only be granted permission to coach matside subject to the Coach successfully completing the Matside Coaching Module at the appropriate level. BJA Level 1 Coaches will be granted permission to coach matside for All Level 3 competitions and the following Level 4 competitions 10/11-year-old Nationals and British Schools only.
- 3. Level 2 Coach Direction** – For the purpose of this document “under the direction of a BJA Level 2 coach” equates to the BJA Level 2 coach mentoring the BJA Level 1 Coach, this would include agreement on when and how often the Level 1 coach would coach unaccompanied and working towards independent coaching at the appropriate time. To coach independently the Level 1 coach must be 18 years and be 1st Kyu or above. The BJA Level 2 Coach prepares the class plans and progression plans for classes that the BJA Level 1 Coach will deliver. It is expected that the level 2 coaches would monitor the delivery of the sessions and would observe an actual delivery of at least one session in every eight or more often if more monitoring was required.
- 4. First Aid and SPC** – From 1st March 2015 all coaches can complete an online First Aid or SGPC module every alternate three-year period, however their first course must be face to face. That means coaches only need to attend a face-to-face course every six years. Only sports coach UK SGPC online courses will be accepted for revalidation purposes at this time.

Recommendation

All coaches must have the items below in place prior to their award being approved and their certificate issued and, although not essential, it is recommended that the candidates have these items completed prior to attending an award preparation course.

1. DBS Disclosure (formerly CRB)
2. First Aid Certificate
3. Safeguarding and Protecting Children in Sport Certificate (SPC)
